Save the dates for the upcoming 2020-21 workshops featuring four renowned watermedia artists from around the globe. Registration for all of them begins at noon on July 15th for members, followed by an opportunity for non-members to sign up on September 1st. We have something for everyone to learn.

- Don Andrews begins our workshop season with two workshops - two days each. The first is November 10-11, 2020 and the second November 12-13, 2020. Don Andrews is a nationally known watercolor artist, author and workshop instructor. He is known for his figure and landscape paintings with glowing granular washes and vibrant light.
- Andy Evansen begins 2021 with his workshop scheduled for January 12th to the 15th. He captures landscapes with an economy of brushstroke, taking advantage of the luminosity of watercolors done in just a few washes. He strives to capture everyday scenes in such a way that reveals a hidden beauty - some subjects that many would simply pass by.
- Mark Mehaffey teaches February 9-12, 2021 for four days of wet color. Mark starts with a small plan that arranges all the shapes, then assigns a value to every shape with a lot of contrast in the focal area. This procedure frees you to concentrate on the "how" of painting: handling paint, brush, water and paper.
- Graham Berry will lead us for four days from March 9th to the 12th, bringing a European nuance to his work. Graham says, "My paintings are inspired by the effect of light and shadow on our environment, creating dynamic shapes and colors. I especially enjoy painting people going about their everyday lives."

Creation of SAWG's Past Presidents' Council

With the completion of updates to the Policies and Procedures Manual, I'm excited to announce the formation of a Past Presidents' Council!

First, a little history. When the By-Laws were revised in 2009, it became clear to the Board of Directors that a companion piece was needed. I can recall discussions concerning whether certain Board decisions should be addressed in the By-Laws or documented as policies or recognized as standard operating procedures. Clearly, the By-Laws are intended to stand the test of time and be reviewed every decade or so. Thus, the Policies and Procedures notebook was created. Kudos to Marty Plevel who initiated the process with the big orange notebook! Unfortunately, the project fell by the wayside and the original notebook was lost for several years. Then, in the midst of updating the By-Laws in 2017, the notebook re-surfaced!

Nancy Holmberg, Marti White and I took on the task of updating the Policies and Procedures Manual last winter and were assisted this spring by Monica Hart. As part of the process, Board meeting minutes as far back as 2006 have been located and any decisions made have been noted. The updated manual is now in the hands of Kay Sullivan, our new SAWG President, and will be reviewed and implemented by the Board of Directors.

One of the ideas that resulted from the process acknowledges that we have many new members with exciting ideas and expectations. And, at the same time, there exists a wealth of information and institutional memory available among our Past Presidents.

Recently, an invitation went out to SAWG's Past Presidents asking if they would like to be involved in the formation of this Council. Its purpose was briefly explained and proposed operational guidelines were included. We're still trying to track down current addresses of a few, but several have already responded favorably!

With Masterpiece Manager we have a new website that allows us to sell our artwork online, too. I hope you have visited the new website and explored it to see what is new and available to us now. Since we launched SAWG's new website, https://southernazwatercolorguild.com/index. php, we have 26 members who have purchased 32 packages on our website to display their artwork in various ways. There are three packages that are available, the "Featured Artist Lower Four," "Featured Artist" and "Paintings and Prints." If you wish to stay online after the show, you will need to purchase one of our packages.

The catalogs have arrived and as soon as we open the gallery, we will distribute to those who entered the show and have some extras for sale. They are beautiful.


The next Western Fed show will be held in Salt Lake City, UT in May of 2021, but more on that later. Let's revel in the success of this one under unusual circumstances.

NEW INTERN

"Introducing Jaquelee Chau, Our New SAWG Intern"

Our new SAWG Intern, Jaquelee Chau, is a graduate of the University of Arizona, earning a Bachelor of Fine Arts in Studio Art and 2D/Printmaking with a minor in Art History. Just before coming to SAWG, Jaquelee was working Post Baccalaureate with the U of A Printmaking studio. When the Covid lockdowns hit the studio, the job was put on hold and Jaquelee started looking for an alternative. Fortunately for us, she heard about SAWG from one of her teachers and contacted us about a potential internship.



That was the beginning for us. But for Jaquelee, her route to Tucson was something of an accident.

Born in Hong Kong, Jaquelee had always lived in a densely populated environment. Wherever she found herself in the city she knew that she was merely a few train or bus stops away from more familiar neighborhoods. Her family had moved often within the city, so she has an intimate knowledge schedules and places, so she never felt lost. Like her artwork, Hong Kong is full of interior spaces and familiar spatial relationships.

After graduating from Jockey Club Ti-I College (pronounced tee-yee), Jaquelee started looking for a college in a smaller city, some place with nice weather, some place different from her hometown.

It just worked out that University of Arizona made her an offer to matriculate. When she arrived in 2016, she found herself in a vastly different landscape both in terms of the physical, geographical space and the human one.

"The people are very different here, friendlier, and more interesting in getting to know you" Jaquelee told me. In Hong Kong she was surrounded by people who preferred to stay strangers. In Tucson she found herself surrounded by people that wanted to be her friend.

"I also find myself being more deliberate about how I go somewhere, it's a lifestyle shift", she told me. "There is less infrastructure, I have to think about what I need and where I am. And the saguaros just growing over the hills everywhere was very surprising."

Her goal now is to learn about how a 501(c)3 non-profit functions in the art world. She has a passion for community and how groups achieve their goals. Her approach to work is informed by her work ethic and her family, a bunch of engineers, who give her a bit of an analytical edge.

Like her hometown, Jaquelee's art explores these ideas of intimate living spaces, dense urban areas, and transience. Her work has been exhibited around the US and internationally. She has worked in both block printing and sculpture which uses corrugated board and hand-spun packing tape strings to achieve a sense of airy intimacy.

I propose that this will be a job that the board, chairs and key volunteers can do at our annual retreat which I hope to organize in August. That's another topic, but I wanted to plant the seed and again thank the P&P Committee for their work.
