

# **Decisions, Decisions and More Decisions**

Every day it seems there is a decision that I or the SAWG board of directors need to make. Some decisions are easy such as having to pay the surprise HVAC repair bill of \$1,376 that we received in February. Some are more challenging:

- 1. Should we seek a new location for the gallery? Our lease expires on July 31. By contract, we must decide this month if we will renew the lease with a probable rent increase. Almost 50% of our members live along the zip code corridor of River Road, and about 20% live east of Craycroft. Yes, we plotted our members by zip code. (See attached chart.) North to south, we live from Saddle-Brooke to Sierra Vista and east to west from Saguaro National Park West to the Mount Lemmon highway with outliers in Tumacacori, Kearny, Chandler and Bisbee. It was fun learning these facts but I admit, the thought of moving seems daunting and will require a committee to make it happen.
- 2. If we decide to stay, when should we open the gallery? We will need trained, willing and vaccinated docents. July was suggested with a soft opening in June so we can train folks, clean the gallery, restock and find someone to manage it like Monica used to do.
- 3. The old membership database that holds all the historical information, such as which of your paintings were accepted into what shows for years, needs to be replaced as it is so old that it can no longer be updated and will no longer be supported. Therefore, we are investigating other methods. Do we pay for software changes and move it all into Masterpiece or just create a special Access database that only the VP Shows and Assistant need?

Some of these are pondering subjects which require research, and some are mysteries or puzzles that we must solve. Even though some problems are challenging, it is very rewarding to find the right solution and go forward. I welcome your thoughts on these items and hope you will consider serving on the board if you are called by the nominating committee to help us make decisions.

By the time you read this, hopefully we will have an approved set of revised Bylaws for 2021.

I had a health scare recently with a brief hospital stay, and as a result I needed to reduce some of my workload. I recently resumed the duties of Registrar because I had done the





# March 9, 10 & 11

Graham Berry will be focusing his live workshop on painting people, which is his favorite subject area. He frequents locations with a lot of activity, and takes pictures he then uses back in his studio to interpret their actions. During his workshop, which will take place 3 mornings for 3 hours each, 8 am to 11 am, Graham will divide his lessons into painting 1, 2 and then many people. # Mark Mehaffey Workshop Review

Our February workshop was conducted by artist Mark Mehaffey. This 3-day, 3-hour each day presentation was a new format for SAWG. As it turned out, the reviews for this time period arrangement were excellent, allowing the participants to gather information in the morning and paint suggested assignments on their own later in the day.



Having visited with SAWG in person in 2014, many of the participants were already on familiar ground with what to expect. He began the mornings offering to critique the work of anyone interested in sharing, and then his lessons began. The first day was a review of traditional sketchbook, value study, and color use in creating sound paintings. The second and third mornings were focused on experimental techniques which challenged the best of us. All three days were filled with information, and the reviews received from the participants gave praise to his teaching style and organization. A beneficial experience was had by all.

## What Is a JPEG Name?

Many people are unsure what is meant by the "JPEG Name" on the registration entry form for a show. How is it different from the "Painting Name?" The form requires both. The JPEG Name refers to the name of the image you are submitting to the show and the Painting Name is the name you have given to your piece of artwork. In most shows you may have one or two entries.

## To name your image follow this process:

- 1. For an example we can use Janie Smith's painting "Summer at Lake Tahoe." The digital image that you will submit needs to have a name that the computer will recognize and one that will identify it as belonging to you.
- **2.** The JPEG Name would be the first four letters of your last name followed by the number of the painting (is it the first painting or the second painting you are entering), a shortened version of the Painting Title and .jpg.
- **3.** Janie's JPEG Name would be smit1laketahoe.jpg. The name has no spaces, no capital letters, and no punctuation except for the dot before jpg.
- 4. If Janie has a second entry say "Grandmother's Kitchen" the JPEG Name would be smit2kitchen.jpg.

Sometimes a show will have two people with the same last name. In this case you still use the first four letters of the last name and add the first letter of your first name. If there is a Janie Smith and a Mary Smith it would be smitj and smitm. Do not put the first name letter before the last name because the computer alphabetizes by last names.

I hope this helps you understand the difference and makes it easier for you to do the job of giving your images a JPEG Name.



# Tony Peralta, 1939-2021





It is with a heavy heart that we share the news regarding Tony Peralta's recent passing. Tony is one SAWG member who quietly touched the lives of all of use who we came into contact with. Tony volunteered in many different areas - whether supporting the scholarship group, or participating in the Plein Air group, to helping hang shows, teaching watercolor skills, or just visiting with us all at every general meeting night. He was ready with a smile, generous with his time, and quietly supportive when one needed it. One of my favorite takeaways from Tony is how to loosen up your painting brain before you start painting. How many people still use his tips and tricks to think outside the box, and see watercolors differently today because of them? All of this, with his wry smile and quiet chuckle, making each of use feel like we are an important part of his life. As you can see below - many of us will miss Tony, and these quotes illustrate just some of the ways he touched our membership.

I met Tony in 2007 when I took my first Oasis class. The class was on the top floor of the Macy's building at El Con Mall. I remember how nervous I was to enter a classroom of 20 artists. 
